Your trip to Cass will be filled with the sights and sounds of the past, unparalleled views of the forested mountains and close-up encounters with logging locomotives climbing grades of up to 11 percent.

RESERVATIONS

Company Houses

Reservations may be made by calling or writing Cass Scenic Railroad directly, or by dialing toll-free 1-800 CALL WVA.

When making company house reservations for four nights or more, a deposit of one-half the rental fee is required with the balance due upon arrival; for three nights or less, the full rental fee is required. If you make your reservation by telephone, you will have 10 days in which to make payment, unless it is a last-minute reservation. In case of cancellations, deposits will be returned (with the exception of a \$20 handling fee) if notice is given 30 days in advance or if the company house can be rented.

Dinner and Special Trains

In addition to the regular operating schedule, Cass offers a series of dinner train rides throughout the summer. Also, a variety of special trains are scheduled during the year. Please call in advance for exact dates and reservations.

Passenger Seating

Reservations are always advised. The Greenbrier River and Leatherbark Creek passenger cars offer reservable seating on our regular excursions to Whittaker Station, Bald Knob and Spruce for an additional fee. Private caboose rentals are offered as well. All other passenger cars offer reservable tickets, but only limited seating on a first-come, first-served basis.

YOUR RIDE INTO YESTERYEAR

THE TOWN OF CASS remains much as it was in its heyday as a company-owned logging town starting in 1902. Restored company houses now serve as vacation rentals. From the old Company Store gift shop to Last Run Restaurant, to the Historical Museum and the Cass Showcase diorama and film, to the free guided tours of the railroad shops and town, you'll want to explore this charming town and its surrounding area for days.

The Cass Scenic Railroad was built in 1901 and used to haul lumber to the mill in Cass. The locomotives are the same ones that were used in Cass and in the lumber industry for more than a half-century. The passenger cars are old logging flat-cars refurbished and made into passenger cars. Groups can rent their own car. Small groups of 10 or fewer can rent their own caboose for a special treat kids are sure to enjoy.

Once you board the train, the real excitement begins! The pistons of the locomotive will start pulsing, driven by steam pressure. The gears begin turning, the wheels find traction, and the locomotive begins to move. With smoke belching from its stack, the train pulls away from the station, passing the old water tower from which the locomotive's tender is filled. As the train rounds the curve and starts up Leatherbark Run, you will pass the Cass Shop, where the locomotives are serviced and repaired, and a graveyard of antiquated, fascinating equipment is on sidetracks. As the pressure builds, the locomotive is driven at full steam, and the laborious journey up the mountain toward the two switchbacks begins. The loud huff of the stack, the clanking of gears, the scream of the whistle at the crossings, and the ever



present clackety-clack of the rails will indeed make you feel as if you have been transported back in time. The train soon passes through the first switchback, reverses up a steep grade and ascends to the second switchback where the process is repeated, and then finally into the open fields and Whittaker Station. The switchback process allows the train to gain quick altitude, and in this instance, the train is traversing a grade of 11 percent, or 11 feet in altitude for each 100 feet of track. A two percent grade on conventional railroads is considered steep.

At Whittaker Station, you will have the opportunity to leave the train and enjoy more views of mountainous Pocahontas County or a peaceful picnic lunch. Visit the reconstructed logging camp Whittaker Camp #1. Here you will experience what life was like for a "wood hick" living in the woods and logging the nearby forests. Look inside the living quarters and take a guided tour of the camp car. Round trip to Whittaker Station is approximately two hours. Should you take the 4½ hour trip to Cheat Mountain, your train will proceed on to Bald Knob, West Virginia's third highest point, or Spruce, an abandoned logging town site on the banks of the Shavers Fork River. All of these trips offer majestic mountain scenery and unforgettable adventure.

THE LOCOMOTIVES OF CASS

INVENTED TO DO THE IMPOSSIBLE, the Shay logging locomotive was designed to climb the steepest grades, swing around hairpin curves and negotiate frail temporary tracks. In addition, they had to haul incredibly heavy loads, from woods to mill. Power was all-important.

Back in 1911, West Virginia led the nation with more than 3,000 miles of logging railroad line. It's all gone now, except for the 11 miles at Cass, making Cass Scenic Railroad State Park one of America's only authentic operating museums of lumber railroading.

Unlike standard steam locomotives, Shays and the similarly designed Climax and Heisler engines are driven by direct gearing to the wheels. The smooth, even flow of power enables the engines to negotiate twisting mountain grades. All three types are represented in the Cass collection, the most extensive fleet of operating, geared steam locomotives in the world.

One of the Shays (Western Maryland #6) is the last one ever built and the largest still in existence, weighing more than 162 tons. These working artifacts remain useful today as priceless and antique relics of the grand days of logging by rail. You are invited to look them over and visit our shop where they are carefully maintained to exacting standards.


